Are you looking to make a difference in the NFPA codes being used? Participation on any NFPA Technical Committee is an assured way to becoming an expert in the requirements of that document. The fact that many NFPA codes and standards qualify for the reimbursement program

for enforcers makes committee involvement an easier sell to the powers-to-be during the budget process within an organization. The time commitment to most committees is minimal during the period of time that a code/standard is in cycle (under review for the next edition). For example, the time for Warren Olsen, who serves on Chapter 26 of NFPA 72, is six days (2 meetings of three on-site days each) over a total of three years. Many committees meet even less over the same three year period.

In case you missed it, the residential sprinkler requirement will remain in the 2018 IRC!

We were also successful in gaining approval of two changes that incentivize and support sprinkler requirements, Proposals RB89-16 and ADM36-16. However, we came up short of the required 2/3 majority to overturn committee recommendations on Proposals RB51-16 (dealing specifically with stacked duplexes), and RB69-16 (dealing with protection of lightweight floor assemblies).

From the OSFM - On August 1st, Michael Vogel was selected to lead the Boiler and Pressure Vessel Safety Division. Mr. Vogel studied commercial engineering and drafting technology from ITT Technical Institute in St. Louis. He graduated with an associate's degree of applied sciences. Mike then worked as a draftsman/design engineer for several boiler shops in Illinois. After completing the Great Lakes Area Boilermakers Apprenticeship Program, he became a teacher of students enrolled in this program. During this time, Mike also worked for the Boilermakers Local 363. Mike accepted a position with the OSFM as a Boiler Safety Specialist in 2004, which he held until being chosen as the Division Manager.

In 2017, will you be all that you can be by verifying your technical skills?

Fire issues related to lithium ion batteries have dominated news reports for more than a year. This summer, the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) recalled more than a halfmillion hoverboards that involved 10 companies, and in October the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) banned Samsung Galaxy Note 7 devices from all flights. Flight attendants continue to warn air travelers today to power down their devices during pre-flight safety instructions.

Lithium ion batteries are ideally suited for today's streamlined, lightweight, high-tech consumer products but convenience comes with concern. The compact batteries store a large amount of energy; and if not used properly, can overheat and cause a fire or explosion.

NFPA's new tip sheet explains the problem with these batteries, offers ways to identify issues, shares safety advice, and addresses battery disposal in a visual manner that is perfect for <u>sharing</u> <u>online</u>, via social media or as a <u>printable resource</u>.
